The Dangerous Patient: Medical, Legal and Public Policy Responses

Overview

Risks to the public's health abound in everyday life. Frequently, these risks to the population are connected to the behaviors of individuals. Situations presented, for example, by mentally ill persons who engage in violent conduct at public places resulting in death or serious injury to themselves and others and potentially infectious individuals who knowingly place a large number of other people at risk of contagion by their conduct engender significant medical, legal, and public policy considerations. The medical, legal, and public policy challenges created by these and other threats to the public's health directly confront many health care professionals, attorneys, public officials, and educators. This program will identify and begin to address these important public policy challenges, especially in the context of shifting attention exclusively from attempting to predict and control the behavior of individual patients to a broader population-based intervention perspective.

Program Objectives:

At the conclusion of this program, participants will be able to:

1. Identify the kinds of risks to the public's health that are connected to the behaviors of individuals.
2. Appreciate and analyze the medical, legal, and public policy implications for the public of the threats made and/or behaviors engaged in by individuals.
3. Critique the strengths and shortcomings of analytical approaches that focus on attempting to predict and control individual behavior versus approaches more devoted to broader population-based health interventions.
4. Participate more effectively in discussions about the formulation of public policy aimed at preventing or ameliorating the harm posed by dangerous persons, particularly as public policy may affect the respective roles of health care, legal, and educational professionals.

Dr. Goodman is Co-Director of the Public Health Law Program, Centers for Disease Control and Prevention (CDC) in Atlanta, Georgia, and is former Editor of CDC's Morbidity and Mortality Weekly Report (MMWR) Series. He is Board Certified in both Internal Medicine and Preventive Medicine. A Commissioned Officer in the U.S. Public Health Service during 1978 - 2006, Dr. Goodman held the grade of Medical Director (Captain: O-6). He joined CDC's Epidemic Intelligence Service Program in 1978. He has published on a broad range of topics in applied epidemiology which span surveillance and outbreak investigations of acute infectious diseases, to population-based studies of the epidemiology of homicide, and the law of public health. He also is the lead editor of Law in Public Health Practice, published by Oxford University Press.

Wendy E. Parmet is the George J. and Kathleen Waters Matthews Distinguished Professor and Professor of Law at Northeastern University School of Law and Program Director of the law school's dual degree J.D.-M.P.H. program with Tufts University School of Medicine. She teaches Public Health Law, Health Law, Disability Law, Bioethics, Torts and Constitutional Law. Professor Parmet has published numerous articles in medical journals and law reviews on public health law, disability law, constitutional law, health care access. Professor Parmet is President of the Board of Directors of Health Law Advocates and is on the Board of Directors of the Public Health Law Association. She is also on the ABA's Commission for Mental and Physical Disability Law and is a fellow of the American Bar Foundation.



Douglass Mossman, M.D.
Wright State University Boonshoft School of Medicine & University of Cincinnati College of Law

Dr. Mossman is Professor and Director of the Division of Forensic Psychiatry at the Wright State University Boonshoft School of Medicine, and Administrative Director of the Glenn M. Weaver Institute of Law and Psychiatry at the University of Cincinnati College of Law. He lectures frequently to medical and legal audiences and has authored more than 100 publications on legal and ethical issues, medical decision-making, violence prediction, statistics, and psychiatric treatment. His article, "Critique of Pure Risk Assessment or, Kant Meets Tarasoff (2006)," won the American Psychiatric Association's Manfred S. Guttmacher Award for outstanding contributions to the literature on forensic psychiatry. His 1994 article, "Assessing Predictions of Violence: Being Accurate About Accuracy," has been cited more than 200 times in scientific and legal publications. He is a Distinguished Fellow of the American Psychiatric Association.
